Connections for support and community

Build your social network with dedicated staff and fellow students in our centers who will help you connect with others, find your way through challenges and find your voice.

African American Student Development: Supports African American students by enhancing their



undergraduate experience. Includes the Fannie Lou Hamer Center, a space for Black students and groups to organize and engage in academic and social activities.

Asian Pacific American Student Development: Supports the Asian American and Pacific Islander communities and programs including the Asian Pacific Islander Issues Conference, held at Berkeley since 1990, and the South Asian, Southwest Asian, and North African Initiative.

Basic Needs Center: The campus hub supporting food, housing, and economic justice through prevention, intervention and emergency relief efforts. Services include nutrition and cooking resources, the Berkeley Food Pantry, the Emergency Housing Support program and more.

Berkeley Hope Scholars: Provides support and community for students who are current and former foster youth, probation youth or who were orphaned before the age of 18.

Berkeley International Office: Advising, immigration services, advocacy and programs for international students.

Berkeley Underground Scholars: Recruitment, support and advocacy for formerly incarcerated and justice-impacted students.

Cal Veteran Services Center: Programs and services promoting the academic and personal success of student veterans.

Chicanx Latinx Student Development: Supports Chicanx Latinx students and events including the bilingual Familia Orientation, a Día de los Muertos celebration, the Latinos and the Environment conference and a Chicanx/Latinx graduation.

Disabled Students' Program: With nearly 40 staff members serving 2,700 students, the DSP works with units across campus to provide services and academic accommodations for students with disabilities.



Gender Equity Resource Center (GenEq): Resources, services, education and leadership programs relating to gender and sexuality. The Queer Cal Pals program matches incoming LGBTQ+ students with a current student "buddy" to provide support.

Multicultural Community Center: A student-led, student-won multipurpose community center where students can study, meet and take part in various events and programs.

Native American Student Development: Supports Native American students and events including a community powwow (annually for 40 years and counting) and Native Graduation.

Re-Entry Student Program: Resources and community for the 1,800+ undergraduate students aged 25 and older who are returning to higher education.

Student Parent Center: Holistic support for undergraduate and graduate students who are engaged scholars as well as devoted parents.

Transfer Student Center: Programs, mentoring, advising, classes, workshops and community for students transferring from another college.

Undocumented Student Program: Academic counseling, legal support, financial aid resources and extensive campus referral network for undocumented students.

University Health Services: Comprehensive medical, mental health, insurance and health promotion services for Berkeley students. Named a "Leader in LGBT Healthcare Equality" by the Human Rights Campaign Foundation.

Application Process

Berkeley invites students from all over the world to apply to be a part of our dynamic and spirited community. Students who challenge themselves academically, are engaged inside the classroom and who are committed to making the world a better place, are often great candidates for admission.

Academics

You'll use your transcripts to self-report your coursework and grades. Though the application review process utilizes your self-reported information to make a decision, admissions staff will verify your record with final transcripts, upon admission.

Extracurricular activities

Report any activities or work experience as completely as possible. Use the additional comments space to provide more details and context as needed. While clubs and student organizations are great to report, you can also list other activities, such as family responsibilities and work experience.

Personal insight questions (PIQs)

Your responses to the PIQs let us get to know you. Answer the questions directly and identify examples that tell us the most about yourself.

First-year applicants

We use a holistic review to assess first-year students, considering academic performance, activities and personal factors. We evaluate all achievements — both academic and personal — within the context of your educational circumstances, focusing on how you responded to the opportunities and challenges. Your leadership, lived experiences and interests shape who you are and we want to get to know you.

Transfer applicants

We use a comprehensive review process for transfer applicants that considers both academic and personal achievements, with a stronger focus on academic preparedness. admissions.berkeley.edu/transfer

Minimum requirements to apply:

- 3.0 GPA in all transferable college-level courses (Some majors, like Engineering, require a higher GPA in major preparation coursework.)
- UC Transfer Academic Update form
- Complete Berkeley supplemental form*

*Berkeley supplemental form is only required for select colleges/schools.

Additionally, by the end of the spring term at your current college/university you will need to:

- Complete 60 transferable semester units (90 quarter units)
- Complete courses for the major
- Complete general education requirements*
- Completion of a set of general education courses

- Two transferable courses in English Composition;
- One transferable course in Mathematical Concepts and Quantitative Reasoning; and
- Four transferable courses chosen from at least two of the following subject areas:
 - Arts and Humanities
 - Social and Behavioral Sciences
 - Physical and Biological Sciences

English proficiency exam

Proficiency in English is critical to success at Berkeley. If you completed secondary/high school in a country where English is not the language of instruction, you will need to demonstrate proficiency by achieving:

- 6.5 or higher on the IELTS
- 80 or higher on the TOEFL
- 115 or higher on the Duolingo English Test (DET)

Financial Aid

Grant and scholarship programs

Berkeley offers a wide range of grants and scholarships
— awards that you don't need to repay!

Blue & Gold Opportunity Plan

California residents with family income below \$80,000 per year are eligible to receive grants and scholarships to cover the full cost of UC tuition and fees.

Middle class scholarship

California residents with family income and assets up to \$217,000 may qualify for a scholarship from the state of California to attend Berkeley. Scholarship amounts will vary by student and by school.

Native American Opportunity Plan

California residents enrolled in federally recognized Native American, American Indian, and Alaska Native tribes are eligible to receive grants and scholarships to cover the full cost of UC tuition and fees.

African American Initiative scholarship

Provides financial support for African American students who demonstrate leadership potential and a willingness to contribute positively to the Black community at Berkeley. This scholarship is funded by the San Francisco Foundation and requires a separate application.

UC Promise Pathway

Our lowest income California residents are eligible to receive augmented financial aid packages with a reduced need to borrow and/or work.

UC Berkeley scholarships

Berkeley awards more than \$51 million in privately funded undergraduate scholarships each year. Are you next?

- Berkeley Undergraduate Scholarships: Merit- and need-based scholarships serving more than 2,900 students each year.
- Regents' & Chancellor's Scholarships: Prestigious merit-based renewable awards for top entering firstyears and transfers.
- Fiat Lux Scholarships: Merit- and need-based scholarships for students from partner high schools in Northern and Southern California.
